WOT2GROW COMMUNITY ORCHARD

A New Year and time to start planning what we will be doing from Spring through Summer! We already have a date to start pruning the apples and pears and there is a long list of tasks to be done before next year's fruit is ripening including building a cage base over which we can throw netting having lost all the redcurrants this year to the blackbirds!

The raised beds are under construction for the blueberries and we will be planting up in the new year.

All the fruit has been gathered in and we have picked 187kg of soft fruit, 300kg of apples and 56kg of other top fruit!

The top fruiting apples have been Kidd's Orange Red, Pixie, Sunset, Merton Worcester, Ellison's Orange, Spartan and Grenadier all producing over 20kg per variety. As well as cropping well they all have tasted wonderful and have kept quite well considering we do not have the best conditions for this.

The last of the medlars are about to be turned into medlar jelly having ripened and softened which is called bletting. The quinces have been disappointing because although there were plenty of fruits they turned brown inside very rapidly after picking.

The nuts were stripped from the trees before we could pick them so we need to be quicker next year!

So, we have had mixed results this year but generally the trees are in a good state even if some are not as vigorous as others and next year we look for help from the weather as well as our volunteers to get another productive season. Why not join us and get your share of the harvest???

Don't forget the Wassail on Saturday January 21st 2017 from 5:00pm at the orchard – do join us with stout shoes/boots, torches and something to make a noise!!

SCARECROW WEEKEND TO RETURN FOR 2017

Thank you to everyone who completed the survey on the possible return of the Scarecrow Weekend in 2017.

There were 33 responses and of these 29 were in favour of a Scarecrow Weekend in 2017, 2 didn't know and 2 responded `no`. Of the 33, 29 said they would make and display a scarecrow. There were no preferences for a date if it returned, although 16 indicated June or July and 10 specifically highlighted 1 and 2 July. The top 3 favoured activities were music (27 respondents), children's entertainment (22) and a breakfast in the village hall (21).

Given this level of support from households in the village, the PCC, Village Hall and Parish Council, with support from The Peacock, have therefore decided to go ahead with **a** Scarecrow Weekend.

The date for diaries (after checking what else is on that weekend) is Saturday 1 and Sunday 2 July.

The initial outline for the weekend is as follows:

Throughout the weekend we hope that several gardens will `open` to the public as in previous years, there will be art on display in the village hall, a children's treasure hunt/quiz and a raffle prize draw.

The theme for the weekend (and particularly for scarecrow makers) is `That's Entertainment`.

The weekend will be a fundraiser for the village, with the proceeds going to the PCC for the church and the Village Hall. We hope to announce some specific items the proceeds will support.

The plan is to use collection buckets to raise income from visitors parking in the village which will offer, in return, a sticker to access the open gardens and a treasure hunt/quiz sheet.

Twitter and Facebook will be set up to promote the weekend, along with a poster, and publicity in the Oxhill News and local media.

What next?

- We firstly need volunteers willing to open their gardens (20 of those surveyed like the idea of Open Gardens)
- We will need volunteers for the weekend (23 of those surveyed were happy to volunteer. It could be a couple of hours through to the whole weekend.) - tasks will be various ranging from designing a poster, to early application to the council to close the road along Main Street

The next Oxhill Quarterly Meeting (to discuss and plan village-wide events and involving representatives of the PCC, Parish Council, Village Hall Committee and The Peacock) will be held around mid to late January, when we will be discussing and agreeing on the next actions.

OXHILL GARDEN CLUB

On the evening of Thursday 10th November members were given an insight to the planning and build of a Show Garden by Alan Franklin of Pro Gardens Ltd. Established in 2005 and based in Tysoe, the company provides an all-inclusive service for garden design, landscaping and maintenance. Alan's talk was titled 'A Show Garden for Malvern – how we did it!' and illustrated by slides of the project at various stages of its construction.

Having come up with the garden design concept some twelve months before, Alan had to submit detailed plans to the RHS for approval soon after with the hope that the all important planting that augmented the 'bones' of the design would indeed be ready some nine months later. The 30 square metre plot at the Malvern showground was in a grassed area set aside for the build of show gardens each year. Removal of the turf invariably exposes the 'foundations' of previous projects, which usually have to be dug up and removed before the current year's work can get underway – fortunately at no cost to the exhibitor. Points are deducted by the judges for any exhibit that is not structurally sound.

A mentoring service by experienced garden designers was available during the build and Alan was happy to make use of this. A near disaster occasioned by an 'eleventh hour' failure of a promised fibreglass 'wall' to arrive on site was narrowly averted by a replacement being constructed in aluminium by a local Tysoe blacksmith – but a point was still deducted by the judges as the feature deviated from the submitted plan.

Pro Gardens have a nursery at Hornton where much of the planting is grown for shows but, as was the case for Malvern, plants, shrubs and trees are not always ready in time and other nurseries have to be scoured for quality material in flower or leaf. Even so, a replacement centrepiece birch tree was not actually in leaf on the day and lost a mark. Conversely some grasses surrounding a featured staddle stone were deemed by the judges to have grown too tall! I'm pleased to report that, despite these vicissitudes, Alan and his team came away from Malvern with a 'Silver' and, indeed, went on to win a 'Gold' with the same garden design elsewhere later in the year.

Alan explained that the cost of constructing a show garden was of the order of $\pounds 5k$ per square metre – whether it be 30 or 100 sq m. He was

grateful to his sponsors without whom some show projects would not be possible.

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The January meeting in the Village Hall takes place 7.15 for 7.30pm on the 12th of this month and is "All About Chickens" – the speaker, Jacqui Vallance, of the Warwickshire Chicken Coop (Co-operative?) will explain!

Thanks to all for their great cooking, setting out and putting away.




