£75 ON-THE-SPOT FINE FAILURE TO PAY COULD INCUR A £1,000 FINE

The Law states that a dog owner must 'remove faeces deposited by their dog from ANY land to which the public has access'. Local councils are now encouraging the general public to help to catch the few irresponsible dog owners who leave their dog's mess on the pavement by reporting to the Street Scene team at SDC:

- date and time incident witnessed
- location
- description or name of dog and owner
- car registration if applicable

I hope we do not have to resort to these measures in Oxhill, but unfortunately there are still one or two people who allow their dogs to mess on the pavements. So, this is the last plea – please, this is your village, you know who you are, so please pick up your dog poo. We now have a lot of mums and toddlers in the village and it is unfair to them. SWARMS Swarming is the natural way that a colony of honey bees reproduces. It happens when a new Queen has been formed and is almost ready to emerge from her cell.

Unlike humans, the parent Queen and flying bees choose to leave their home rather than wait for the offspring to leave and set up independently. In preparation, honey bees gorge on honey prior to their journey in search of a suitable nesting site. When they are ready to go the bees leave the hive and can appear as a cloud in the air. We tend to spot them when they subsequently form a cluster, often on a branch of a nearby tree, with the Queen at their centre. Without her there is no future for the colony.

Swarming bees have little interest in people when in swarming mode. Their priority is to find a safe place to set up their new colony, so you have little to fear from them. You should still act with caution, however, as they are a wild insect.

If you see a resting swarm then please contact a local beekeeper who will come and collect them. There are over 1200 BBKA members registered to collect swarms; To find your nearest collector visit:

Bees in a cluster can be badly affected by high winds and heavy rainfall; please contact us as soon as possible if you see a swarm.

Although a beekeeper will give advice about other species of bee or honey bee nests in buildings or inaccessible places, he/she will not be able to deal with same.

WOT2GROW COMMUNITY ORCHARD

The first signs of Spring are all around the orchard. The first dandelions and daisies are appearing, the apricot blossom is breaking,

always the harbinger, and the peaches and nectarines are not too far behind them. Our living willow hedge, or fedge, has come to life with beautiful furry catkins! It will be a couple of weeks before the fruit trees break bud and also the raspberries but the gooseberries are already green and the currants have lots of buds about to burst. And of course the grass needs regular mowing!!



Now is the time when the work ramps up as we weed and feed the trees and canes. Also it is the time for vigilance, the tiny eggs overwintering in the crevices of the trees are beginning to come to life and produce amongst

other bugs the infamous rosy apple aphid. This little greyish pink aphid is the scourge of the apples and needs to be eradicated if possible. Some good organic spraying including garlic, seaweed and soap really worked last year and all aphids were drastically reduced.

The sensory garden is coming back to life and we have an abundance of herbs! It needs a good tidy up so that it remains the perfect place to sit and look and listen. We have so many more species of birds at the orchard compared with when we started, great to see kite, buzzards and gold finch along with the usual suspects!



Do come along and see how beautiful the setting is and how the orchard adds to the general good feeling and wonderful surrounding countryside.

LATEST ON THE OXHILL SCARECROW WEEKEND 1 AND 2 JULY

Under 100 sleeps to go until 1 July and the return of our Scarecrow weekend; not that the organisers are having any sleepless nights!

In fact the response has been brilliant from the village, to date, with over 50 offers of volunteer help. However, we still need volunteer first aiders to make sure we fulfil our health and safety obligations. Can you help us? If so, please contact Katy Dowding as below.

Meanwhile, a huge thank you to volunteer Lynsey Cleaver from the village (see her work at www.paintedinteriors.co.uk), who has designed the very eye catching poster you can see. We will use it to promote the event in local outlets, and a version for newspaper advertising.

We can also confirm that the scarecrow making weekend will be Saturday 24 and Sunday 25 June. All very welcome!

Here, to get you in the mood, is a 'recipe' we have found to make scarecrows, courtesy of the renowned Belbroughton Festival over in Worcestershire.

1 stake about 6ft (2m) long...
1 stake about 3ft (1m) long
1 stake about 12inches (30cm) long
Some old clothes
A pair of tights or a pillow case
Some straw or other filling
Some string and/or wire

First you need to make the frame for your scarecrow. Tie the 3ft stake to the long one about 12 inches down from the top to make a cross shape. Then tie the other stake about half way down.

To make the head, fill a pillowcase or the leg of a pair of tights with straw and fashion it into a round shape. Tie the end with string and secure the 'head' to the top of your frame. Paint, draw or sew on some facial features.

Get your old clothes and stuff with straw. Place the shirt on the short cross piece and secure. Pull one leg of a pair of trousers onto the long stake - the other leg will hang alongside it.

Secure the waist of the trousers to the pole with some string or a belt, add a jaunty hat with some straw hair and you have your very own rustic masterpiece!

If you wish your scarecrow to survive the elements for a season or two then try sealing the straw stuffing inside two waterproof layers and use plenty of wire to stop your scarecrow falling apart when it's windy.

Then place your scarecrow in a prominent position where it'll be something of a conversation piece among your neighbours and visitors!

There are many opportunities to extend the curriculum and excite the children in their learning. Recent visits include a trip for the oldest children to the Greek Gallery at the British Museum. The children also enjoyed recognising landmarks of London on their journey.

They toured the castle kitchen and scullery, walked on the ramparts and searched in the maze. Class 3 were invaded by the Vikings from the Longship Company. The children spent the whole day in hands-on observations of Viking artefacts like weapons, animal skins, clothing and tools.

MINUTES OF A MEETING OF OXHILL PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON TUESDAY 7th MARCH AT 8.00PM IN THE VILLAGE HALL.

The meeting, chaired by Grenville Moore was attended by Councillors Duncan Harper, Stuart Whittaker and Sue Hunt, apologies were received from Derek Harbour. One member of the public attended.

<u>Minutes</u> – Minutes of the previous meeting were read, agreed and signed.

Matters arising

<u>Defibrillator</u> - Councillor Whittaker will explore possibilities for a defibrillator to be obtained and located in the village, a first aid training linked to this will also be explored.

Moving the 30 mile an hour speed limit- The matter has been added to the list for the delegated budget expenditure, which will be decide after the elections in May. Stratford District Council will be contacted about the wobbly sign on the Green Lane.

The Leys Field update- The Parish Council is awaiting dates for a meeting with the developers, the village email loop will be used to inform residents of the date and time when it has been arranged.

Landscaping for the open space- an introductory meeting has taken place, the fee for producing initial plans which would come from the designated S106 funds is £3,500 +VAT and expenses. The plans would then be available for consultation. It was proposed by Grenville Moore and seconded by Sue Hunt that the quote be accepted for the plans so that they can be drawn up for consultation.

<u>Church Orchard</u>- Stratford District Council Planning Enforcement will be contacted with regard to the replanting of 8 trees which had previously been removed without permission

<u>Footpath Bridge</u> – The Bridge on the footpath leading from the Church Orchard is blocked with debris due to recent high water levels, this is

causing one end of the bridge to be lifted and for it to become unstable. There is also a large hole in the bridge which would cause a hazard to children when crossing the bridge. Stratford District Council – footpaths will be contacted.

<u>Planning</u> – Permission has been approved for; Reserved matters at Stable Croft, Green Lane. A dwelling at Oxfield Farm. Permission has been refused for a dwelling on land adjacent to the Hollies, Rouse Lane. Planning pending – Arboricultural works at Auchneiven House, Whatcote Road. Planning for 4 dwellings at Applegrove, Whatcote Road. Change of use to barns at Harrods Farm and work to a Larch tree at St Lawrence's

Church and also to trees at The Old Church House, Main Street. Stansgate Homes have contacted the Parish Council Chairperson to request a meeting to discuss developing the Transport Yard on the edge of the village.

Finance

<u>Transparency Fund</u> – The computer, software and printer have been purchased, at a cost of £443.50, the Parish Clerk was paid the sum of £342.00 for the set up and maintenance of the website and the quarterly charge (£18) for the website was paid, using funds identified in the transparency fund allocation. Payments were proposed by Grenville Moore and Seconded by Sue Hunt.

Mowing of the Church yard a sum of £600.00 was paid to support the costs of mowing and maintenance for 2016. Proposed by Grenville Moore and seconded by Stuart Whittaker.

Correspondence

<u>Dog fouling</u> – This remains an issue in serval areas in the village. In order to address the issue the Dog Warden at Stratford District Council will be able to loan kits and resources to affected Parish Councils. It was agreed that Oxhill would like to be included in the scheme and an item will be submitted to the Oxhill News this month.

<u>Better Broad Band</u> – The Government are currently offering funding in the form of a subsidy to ensure that every home and business in the country

has access to a basic broad band service. Details on how to apply will be put on to the notice board and submitted to the Oxhill News.

Any other Business

Oxhill News— The Parish Council is pleased to hear that extra copies of the Oxhill News are being sent to others who have an interest in the village, even reaching as far as Australia. The parish Council are happy to supply extra copies of the Oxhill News at £5 per year to cover the cost of printing.

There being no other business the meeting closed at 9.10 pm. Date of the next meeting 9th May 8.00pm in the Village Hall.


