DEANERY NEWS FOR APRIL

April, of course, begins this year with Easter Day: so, may you know the joy of the resurrected life in Jesus Christ this Easter.

Easter is a time when early Christians were baptised, so it is appropriate that soon after Easter, on Sunday April 15th Bishop Christopher will be conducting a Deanery Confirmation Service at Long Compton at 5.00pm. At the beginning of May, the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby is visiting the Diocese for a few days, to mark both the Centenary of the Diocese, and also the quarter Centenary, 25 years, since his own ordination as priest. Justin was of course ordained in Coventry diocese, and served here for many years, as curate, vicar and Canon for Reconciliation. As part of the celebration, everyone is invited to come to all or part of a Centenary Festival with the Archbishop at the Cathedral on Saturday, May 5th. There is also an invitation, especially to younger adults and teenagers, to bring a friend to an evangelistic event and hog roast over in Southam deanery on the Thursday evening, May 3rd. Full details will be available over the coming weeks.

Finally, Thursday, May 10th is Ascension Day, and there will be a special Deanery Communion Service for Ascension Day at Preston-on-Stour at 7.30 pm that evening. Weather permitting, we always aim to start outdoors, and Rev Canon Christopher Lamb will be preaching that evening.

MINUTES OF A MEETING OF OXHILL PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON TUESDAY 13th MARCH AT 8.00PM IN THE VILLAGE HALL.

The meeting, chaired by Grenville Moore was attended by Councillor, Duncan Harper and Derek Harbour apologies were received from Sue Hunt. Councillor John Fielding, and Councillor Chris Williams Members for Kineton & Red Horse Division also attended.

Minutes – Minutes of the previous meeting were read, agreed and signed.

Matters arising

New Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) draft for consultation- Having read the document the Parish Councils feel that the document is comprehensive and therefore will not submit comments for the consultation. Proposed by Derek Harbour and Seconded by Duncan Harper.

Data Protection Fee – This has been introduced and will need to be paid annually in May. The fee for Oxhill Parish Council will be £40 due to number of employees and turnover. The registration process will be completed in due course. Due to changes in legislation the Parish Council will no longer be able to use Mike Collins as a conduit for information. Therefore, if you would like to be kept up to date with important issues please contact the Parish Council by email clerk@oxhillpc.uk giving your permission for them to store your email address and contact you or post your email contact details and permission through one of the Councillors or clerk door. We will then add your details to the contact list. Proposed by Duncan Harper and Seconded by Grenville Moore.

Road name on Green Lane for houses at the rear of Stablecroft- The Parish Council have proposed that the name Groves be included in the name due to the long family connection with the village and this piece of land in particular.

Clerks Position- A new clerk for the village has been appointed and will start over the next few months. WALC congratulated the Parish Council on the quality and professionalism of their advert.

Phone Box- Over the next few months the phone will be removed, the electricity disconnected and the box removed – no date has as yet been set. The Parish Council will then look to erect a bus shelter in this location.

Leys Field- Problems with flooding have been reported along Main Street. The Parish Council has spoken to the planning officer who have stated that they are not happy with the planning application and that they will approach the developer before it goes to consultation. It has been requested that the planning officer liaise closely with the Parish Council so that they can make appropriate response. Councillor John Fielding will also liaise with the appropriate people in this matter.

Planning – Permission has been approved for: Position of dwellings on Plot 3 Green Lane, Repainting the timber on Church Leaze Barn, and A vary of permission at Applegrove.

Planning pending: Land adjacent to Oxbourne House, Land at Short Meadow, Oak woods House- Green Lane, Trees at The Old Rectory, Re-roofing at the Manor and Reserved Matters on the Leys Field.

Finance

Payments were made for the following : –

£19.76 for the Website/ email quarterly charge – Freeola Proposed by Grenville Moore and Seconded by Duncan Harper

£324.00 for the printing of the Oxhill News from October to February– Tysoe Children’s Group Ltd proposed by Grenville Moor and Seconded by Derek Harbour.

£200 for the Mowing of the Village Hall – Oxhill Village Hall Committee – Proposed by Grenville Moore and Seconded by Duncan Harper.

£600 for the mowing of the Church Yard – St Lawrence PCC – Proposed by Grenville Moore and Seconded by Duncan Harper.

£526.80 for the Defibrillator Box - The Defib Pad – Proposed by Grenville Moore and Seconded by Duncan Harper.

Audit – Due to the size of the Parish and precept amount the Parish Council can apply for an exception from the external audit which would cost £200. The usual internal audit will take place and accounts will be posted on the website in line with transparency code. Proposed by Grenville Moore and Seconded by Derek Harbour.

Defibrillator – The defibrillator code will be held by the landlord of the pub residents in the immediate area and those residents who attend the training on its use. The Parish Council will need to allocate funds for replacement pads should the need arise for it after use. Proposed by Derek Harbour and seconded by Grenville Moore.

Any other Business

Gilkes Lane – It has been reported that the road surface on Gilkes Lane in is a very poor condition Councillor Chris Williams will pursue the matter.

Footpath Bridge – Further damage to the bridge has been reported, and the area taped off. The landowner has been contacted to rectify the situation.

Foot path behind the houses on Main Street – As this is impassable the Parish Council will investigate reopening this so that it can be included in the manor walks.

Report by Councillor John Fielding– A full report was distributed to all Councillors. A summary of the main points is;

- In Warwickshire there were many GP's reaching retirement, leading to vacancies which is a concern.
- South Warwickshire Clinical Commissioning Group will focus on 3 main areas - Out of Hospital, Personalisation, Specialist Provision
- A report given by the Warwickshire Police and Crime Commissioner stated that prevention of crime was crucial, as was the Gypsy and Traveller Protocol

Report by Councillor Chris Williams – A full report was distributed to all Councillors. A summary of the main points is;

- The council tax will increase by 4.99% this year.
- This year there will be no reduction in front line services.
- Highways – some roads have deteriorated significantly due to the recent bad weather. Please use the pot hole hotline areas requiring repair.
- Well- being and health remain a priority for Warwickshire Health and Well- being board.

There being no other business the meeting closed at 9.30 pm. Date of the next meeting 8th
May 8.00pm in the Village Hall.

Make sure there is a 7" hole under your fence or in a wall to enable the hedgehogs to come and go. They do like to roam over a fair distance during the night. Thank you to the many of you who have been feeding our prickly friends. It was so wonderful to see so many in my garden last year of all shapes and sizes proving there is a growing healthy population of hedgehogs in the village. Keep up the good work

NATURE NOTES FOR APRIL

April is the Roman month of Aprilis from the verb aperire – to open. Seems to fit well with the feeling of the month, buds opening creating that soft haze of lime green covering the hedgerows and dark winter branches, doors and windows flung open letting in that sweet smell of growth and warmth. Brimstone butterflies are already on the wing, soon to be joined by Peacock, Speckled Wood and Orange Tip butterflies.

Last month I wrote about the young male buzzard I had rescued from the plough. Interestingly I have found out that another buzzard has also been recovered in the village under almost the same circumstances and about the same time, but this one was taken to the RSPCA and I believe has recovered. Back to ‘Billy’ as we called him – I had taken him over to the Vale Wildlife Sanctuary where they have the food and facilities to look after him. I had kept in touch, phoning every few days. He steadily began to put on weight, but was unable to fly for some two weeks. By the third week he had come up to full weight and was flying well in their outside aviary, so arrangements were made to go and collect him and release him more or less where I had found him. On arrival at the centre I was told not to try and handle him; he was larger and very feisty, and the box that contained him was securely taped up! On the way home he tried several times to burst out of the box, now on Jane’s lap. I have to say I did for a minute have a vision of two adults and one small dog all trapped in a car by a ferocious wild buzzard flying round and round in that small space. Thankfully we managed to keep the lid down and arrived safely back in the village. We carried the box down the long meadow behind the church and got set to release him. Well, all I can say is he erupted out of the box the minute the tape came off – he looked HUGE close up!



He flew across the field and settled into a tree and immediately crows started mobbing him, but within a minute there was a mewling* call from across the field and in came a female adult buzzard closely followed by the adult male. The parent birds had seemingly come to collect him, and



all three lifted on the wind and soared off across the fields. I have to say it was for some reason very emotional and I think all five of us who had come to see him off had a bit of a tear in our eyes. Let's hope that now the severe weather

is over they will all be able to find food. Buzzards are mainly carrion scavengers. The other day I also picked up a meadow pipit that was grounded, but once warmed and fed, flew away.

This month look out for the Lyrid meteor shower from 16th to 25th. They radiate from the constellation Lyra but will appear all over the sky. Also look out for the arrival of the first swallows, and later in the month swifts, and although not yet at full volume, the dawn chorus is increasing all the time. Spring is here.

* The call a bird of prey makes comes from the cage or building used to house trained hawks, especially while they were moulting. These buildings were often next to or part of the stables/carriage house and that's where we get the name for mews in towns.

WOT2GROW COMMUNITY ORCHARD

What an interesting month weather wise! The snow was fortunately brief and dry so the orchard did not suffer any damage but the buds on the fruit trees certainly stayed put in the bitter cold. The rain was plentiful but not too bad as the soil is very free draining and the winds did not wreak havoc on the trees!

March heralded a very busy time as we try to complete all the soft fruit pruning, weeding and feeding round the fruit trees and doing the initial spraying for fungal and aphid infestations. With over 180 trees that is a lot of work and some of it will spill over into April, mainly the soft fruit feeding and weeding.

April heralds the early blossom which always lifts the spirits but makes us wary of frosts, the openness of the site does lead to sharp temperature drops and we have lost plenty of blossom in the past. But as most of the trees are now well established they can withstand a lot more harsh weather. The windbreak trees are growing well and are bushing out so will help to break some of the gusts that sweep off the hills and across the orchard. They will not be allowed to grow too tall but will provide protection and habitat for birds and wildlife. We have seen such an increase in biodiversity since we started at the orchard and hopefully we can encourage even more species.
