WOT2GROW COMMUNITY ORCHARD

The fruit is ripening in the good summer sunshine but everything is very dry and that means reduced crops of very intense flavoured fruit! The water butts have nearly run out but we are saving them to water the blueberries which are producing their first fruit which is very different from the supermarket offerings! Our members get the bulk of the harvest so why not join us and enjoy some tasty fruit!

The summer prune of the stone fruit has gone well but as the trees get larger they do take a bit longer to keep them in shape. It is encouraging to see the different shapes and sizes of tree which means the orchard is really beginning to look like an orchard.



However none of the trees will be allowed to grow to their potential heights which would make it difficult to harvest the fruit. Despite the June drop some of the apple trees are heavily laden so further thinning has been done. Due to the wet winter and spring there is a lot of very green growth on all the trees which is not capable of holding so much fruit! But the number of apples bodes well for Apple Day on 21st October in Tysoe.

The wild flower strips continue to thrive despite the abundance of nettles, thistles and dock which are ever present in the old field soil. Some of these plants are most welcome but care is needed to make sure they don't dominate the strips!

We are off the Shenington Road behind the allotments and are working on Wednesday and Sunday mornings from 9:30 for a couple of hours.

Minutes of a Parish Council Meeting
held on Tuesday 10th July 2018 at 8.10pm in the Village Hall

Councillors Present

Cllr Harbour (Chairperson), Cllr Hunt and Cllr Moore.

Clerk to the Council, Mrs C Coles, District Councillor J Feilding and three villagers.

Before the meeting started the Chair announced that he had received a letter of resignation from Cllr Whittaker. He thanked him for his input over the last few years. The Parish Clerk will notify SDC of the vacancy and an official notice will be placed on the notice-board.

18/14. To receive apologies for absence

Cllr Harper, Cllr Chris Williams

18/15. To receive Declarations of Interest under the Council's Code of Conduct relating to business on the agenda

No interests were declared.

18/16.To approve and sign the minutes of the meetings held on 16th May 2018

The minutes of the previous meetings were approved and signed.

18/17.To note any matters arising from the minutes not included on this agenda for report only

Footpath behind Main Street - The owners have been away and work on stiles is unfinished.

The Chair and Cllr Moore to speak to the owners.

Area in front of the pub - Cllr Moore and Cllr Harper to visit and measure the area.

18/18.To receive a report from the County and District Councillor

The main points of the report from Cllr Feilding included:

A compulsory purchase order will be made to protect Wellesbourne Airfield as it is an important space. Wireless Fibre Broadband is not going as well as planned.

18/19. To discuss Councillor profiles for the website

Councillors are to write a brief statement about themselves to be included on the website.

18/20.To receive an update on Leys Field

Cllr Feilding has met the new Planning Officer. The S106 agreement was discussed and the calculations have changed. The play area has been built by the contractor but there is not enough money for swings. The 106 has not been signed and has to be updated. The play area is under maintenance of the contractor for 12 years and then reverts back to Parish Council control. The ownership of land will go to the estate. Cllr Moore had also spoken to the Planning Officer and agreed the play area could be improved. The Leisure Officer will look and make their own judgement. The problem has arisen as the attenuation pond has moved and no play area or open space can be built over drainage.

From the floor Lis Stuart spoke about CIL money from previous developments which is due to the village. This question will be asked at the meeting with the Planning Officer.

Action: A meeting about the Leys Field development is to be arranged with the Planning Officer either on site or at the offices at Stratford Upon Avon.

18/21.To discuss the idea of a Neighbourhood Plan

Following the last Parish Council meeting there has been some interest in turning the Parish Plan into a Neighbourhood Plan. The cost involved is between £5-10K and would take between 1-2 years to complete. Some money could be used from the budget this year and the remainder next year. There will have to be interest from the village to form a separate committee. The Neighbourhood Plan would have to fit in with the Core Strategy. Cllr Moore asked how Neighbourhood Plans are standing up in law? If it fits in with the Core Strategy and is approved it has a high standing in law. The Tysoe Neighbourhood Plan has just been circulated. If sufficient people come forward then discussions can continue.

Action: The Chair to draft an article for the Oxhill News.

18/22. To receive an update on planning

Three new applications had been received since the last meeting:

Two items of correspondence were highlighted:

Warwickshire County Council, Speed survey results.

The speed survey results had been received and analysed by the Chair.

The most affected road is Whatcote Road and the least affected is Green Lane. Cllr Hunt thanked the Chair for the detailed analysis. Heavy goods vehicles include both farm and Heavy Goods Vehicles.

Traffic calming was discussed but this is dependent on street lights. Cllr Feilding is to meet Cllr Williams about the verges and mess on Green Lane and they may talk about speeding at the same time.

Action: The Chair and Parish Clerk to draft a letter to Highways and the Police Crime Commissioner.

WALC, Internal Auditors and Professional Indemnity Insurance. The Parish Council have received advice from WALC that internal auditors require Professional Indemnity Insurance in case anything goes wrong with the Finances and there is an insurance claim. This will be discussed at a later meeting in the year.

18/25. To receive Councillors Reports

Cllr Moore has chased the new footbridge. The problem is finding the labour to fit the bridge although volunteer labour could be used.

Action: Cllr Moore to draft an article for the Oxhill News.

There being no other business the meeting closed at 8.55pm. The date of the next meeting is 11th September at 8pm in the Village Hall.

PROPOSAL FOR A NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN FOR OXHILL

Many of you will be aware that several villagers from Oxhill, led by Sue Hunt, produced a first class Parish Plan (PP) in 2014 that was submitted to Stratford District Council (SDC) and ultimately, adopted by them. Whilst this is an excellent document, like all Parish Plans, it carries far less weight than a Neighbourhood Plan (NP), by the Planning Department when new developments are being considered.

There are around 6 levels of criteria that have to be considered by the SDC Planners and having an adopted NP is in the second level whereas a Parish Plan is a level six criteria and as such does not carry much weight.

Your Parish Council thinks that it would be a good idea to ‘upgrade’ our existing PP to turn it into an NP and because the work done on the original PP was so extensive, we do not believe that it would take a great deal of effort. However, to successfully do this, it will need a wider representation from the village than just the Parish Council, ie we will need some volunteers! There are costs involved in taking this from a draft to a completed document and the Parish Council should have sufficient funds to provide the necessary support from this year’s and next year’s budgets. We cannot guarantee that producing a Neighbourhood Plan will solve all of the Planning challenges that the village might potentially face but it is a legally recognised document and it will have to be consulted by Developers and Planners alike. Therefore, we will have more say in the way that the village grows and the amenities that would benefit us.

If you would be prepared to work to benefit our community, we are probably looking at a few hours during one evening per month for the next 6 months, starting in September, please either e-mail me or call me.

OXHILL MOUNTAINEER CLIMBS INTO THE RECORD BOOK

On 24th June, Oxhill resident - Mick Groves - completed the successful ascent of the active volcano – Cotopaxi in Ecuador.

Aged 73 yrs and 9 months, Mick is believed to be the oldest person ever to summit this 5,897 metre (19,347 ft) mountain.

This ascent of Cotopaxi had the usual precipitous snow slopes, glacier climbing and crevasses to circumnavigate but was made more complex by the presence of toxic sulphur gasses emitted by the volcano near its summit on its crater rim.

Though Mick carried a gas mask as a precaution, on this occasion the ferocious winds at the summit dissipated the gasses to an acceptable level and the gas mask was not needed.

Due to the lower air pressure at this summit altitude there is only about 50% of the oxygen available at sea level. This not only detrimentally affects breathing but also digestion and brain function(!)

Cotopaxi has a (sort of) claim to be the fourth highest mountain on earth! This is due to its close proximity to the equator and the earth's oblate spheroid (slightly flattened) shape. Measured from the earth's center

Mount Everest is only the 28th highest mountain at 6,382.4 kilometres whilst Cotopaxi is 6,384.1 kilometres – some 1,700 metres (5,577 ft) higher!

Mick has considerable experience of high altitude mountaineering having previously climbed peaks in Nepal, Tibet, Tanzania, Argentina and Ecuador, as well as the French, Italian, and Swiss Alps.

To prepare for these expeditions in mountainless Warwickshire, Mick undergoes three month long training regimes including intensive circuit training at the local gym (at Shipston on Stour), cross country runs around Oxhill, and hill climb repetitions on Edgehill and Sunrising Hill carrying a backpack loaded with 15kg of bottled water.

“None of these expeditions would be possible without the help and support of my wife – Margaret” says Mick “She gives me positive encouragement, puts up with the disruption of my early morning training sessions, keeps the home fires burning in my absence, as well as coping with the anxieties of often poor communications (I was climbing on Everest when an icefall collapsed – killing 16. It was two days before I could let Margaret know I was safe) and last but not least – all the extra laundry both the training and expedition generate”

Mick has no immediate plans for further mountaineering expeditions, “It is important to let one’s body fully recover from the debilitating effects of high altitude living” says Mick – He lost 7kg in weight in 16 days during this latest Ecuadorian adventure!

Mick encourages all septuagenarians to keep fit and active but cautions that high altitude mountaineering only suits those fortunate enough to have large lungs, healthy hearts, stubborn determination, and a complete lack of common sense!

UBUS – COMMUNITY TRANSPORT SERVICE

UBUS is a dial-a-ride community transport service operating within Stratford District.

UBUS is available to anyone in the district who struggles to access public transport due to mobility issues, health problems or who lives in an area with no, or infrequent, public transport.

Passengers can travel between 9:30am and 2:30pm.

UBUS will collect passengers from their door, drop them off at their destination, pick up again at the agreed point and drop off back at home. Drivers can assist passengers to get on & off the bus and will help with up to 3 shopping bags or a trolley if necessary.

All UBUS vehicles can accommodate a wheelchair.

Depending on where residents live in the district a single journey costs £2.10, £2.70 or £3.40. Return journeys £4.20, £5.40 or £6.80.

Residents living in an Orbit property are eligible for a £0.60 discount on their journey.

Journeys need to be booked in advance. Passengers can book up to seven days in advance.

UBUS provides transport in different parts of the district on specific days.

- West of Stratford - Operates on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays & Fridays
- East of Stratford – Operates on Mondays, Wednesdays & Fridays
- South of Stratford – incl OXHILL - Operates on Tuesdays, Wednesdays & Thursdays
- Stratford Town - Operates on Mondays to Fridays
- Southam & Surrounding area – Operates on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays

UBUS can be used to visit friends, attend social groups, leisure activities or go shopping. It cannot be used to attend medical appointments.
