## **PRESENTATION FROM SHIPSTON POLICE ON IMPROVING THE SECURITY OF OUR POSSESSIONS**

On Wednesday May 8th there will be a Presentation from Shipston Police on ways that we can better protect our possessions from Chainsaws to Paintings and TVs to I-Pads and Bicycles! Stratford District Council Rural Crime Advisors working with Shipston Police and Neighbourhood Watch have negotiated some special deals with the suppliers of some very clever security technology for us to use and adopt.

We have, sadly, recently seen some examples of thieves taking advantage of the number of 'white vans' in the village to rob village properties. One way of trying to prevent this is by better marking our property and letting outsiders know that our possessions are security marked and therefore of less value to thieves because the true owners can easily be identified. If a high percentage of us use these various security marking methods and we make it known that people in Oxhill are doing this then we expect thieves to leave our village alone.

To make this effort worthwhile, we need to involve as many villagers as possible so please come along at **7.00pm on Wednesday May 8th to the Village Hall** to listen to the brief presentation and Q&A session to find out more and potentially book an appointment for the marking of your tools and mowers, etc, **at your homes on May 11th**. There will be tea, coffee and biscuits available at no cost for all attendees at the presentation.

## **SING JOYFULLY – AN AFTERNOON CONCERT ON 14th APRIL**

Barcheston Church hosts a concert by Shipston's a cappella choir Cantamus in support of the church organ fund at 3.p.m. on Sunday afternoon 14th April. Cantamus is directed by its founder, Richard Emms, and the music is matched by witty and poignant readings chosen by Anne Hume. The programme starts in uplifting and joyful mode "With a Voice of Singing", and closes with a gentle Irish folk song. In between, audience members can enjoy music from across 5 centuries, from Byrd to the Beatles, via Cole Porter and celebrated contemporary composer, James MacMillan! Anne's readings, including poetry and prose, perfectly complement the music, the church, and its setting.

The earliest surviving parts of St. Martin's date from the 12th century, and the bell tower houses three bells, the first of which was cast in 1596, when several of the composers featured in the concert were writing music. The church also houses the elaborate 16th century alabaster tomb of William Willington.

#### **To approve the minutes of the meeting on 8th January 2019**

The minutes of the meeting held were approved and signed.

#### **Matters Arising**

New planters will be ordered for the area outside the pub. The bus shelter is too costly to progress.

#### **To discuss a Litter Pick**

It was agreed to hold one on Saturday 6th April with refreshments in the village hall afterwards.

#### **To discuss Security Marking**

It was agreed to look at this following the vans being broken into. There are three main security marking techniques available. A presentation will be held in the village hall on 8th May.

#### **To consider the report on Traffic Calming**

Councillor Chris Williams has confirmed in writing he will give a grant of £3K for the traffic calming project. Warwickshire Traffic has agreed to a junction sign being placed on the Whatcote Road near Heritage Farm and the word 'SLOW' being painted on the road near Green Lane. The scheme will be re-costed. The design cost of £200.00 which has been paid for will be deducted from the final cost.

## WOT2GROW COMMUNITY ORCHARD

Has Spring arrived? A question we have all been asking over the last few weeks as we moved from very warm February into roaring March with lots of rain! Officially we have in terms of the Met Office seasons and the plants have certainly done their bit to try and convince us.

The pruning was completed apart from seven really large apple trees that need summer pruning for shape rather than encouraging them to grow after winter pruning. The early blossom from the apricots started in late February, not much earlier than in previous years, and the nectarines and peaches followed in early March with the pears and plum family not far behind. The bees have been very happy with the blossom and enjoyed an early feed and the ladybirds emerged in the sun to get ready to help in the battle with the aphids which will soon arrive.



Unfortunately it has been too wet and windy to do the organic spraying which was so successful last year. The first spray is just before bud break to tackle the aphid eggs, the second at bud break to stop any migrating into the buds and the third at blossom time to remove as many as possible from the developing fruits!! A lot of garlic is used in this process!!

Lots to do before we get into the spring feeding including the tidying up of the sensory garden, which looks lovely with its edging of daffodils, and replacing damaged weed suppressant material around lots of the bushes.

Do come along, maybe help out, and enjoy your community orchard behind the allotments along the Shenington Road in Tysoe! Why not join us and enjoy the fruit we grow.
