WOT2GROW COMMUNITY ORCHARD



Autumn is the most amazing season in terms of what weather we get and how the orchard fares!!

This year has been very different from the last few and the amount of rain we can only hope will provide us with a bumper fruit crop next year. We

have had a very reasonable crop of top fruit compared with a lot of people but we do have a vast number of varieties, in excess of forty, and one hundred and eighty plus trees, a bit bigger than most people's orchard!! The high winds have meant a lot of windfalls and the slugs have had a field day but some of the fruit is in good condition and absolutely full of flavour and juiciness. The cider apples in particular have been heavy croppers and we will wait a while to make sure they are ready for production.

OWLS (OXHILL WILDLIFE SOCIETY) MEETING 15 OCTOBER 2019

Apart from ongoing work on the churchyard, OWLS has been fairly dormant for the last twelve months, and with the increased interest in wildlife extinction and climate change, it was decided to have an open meeting to see if there were other residents who would like to get involved and bring some fresh ideas. I am pleased to say that seven new members came forward, pushing our number up to 18. OWLS was formed ten years ago and was then technically affiliated to the Parish Council. A call had gone out to all Parish Councils to explore the possibility of forming parish groups to help carry out a nationwide Local Biodiversity Action Plan (LBAP). This aimed to improve, preserve or re-establish all forms of fauna and flora and try to link up wildlife corridors between parishes. Unfortunately, most of the funding was withdrawn and the scheme virtually died. However, many parishes carried on with the general aims of the plan.

Oxhill Wildlife Society (OWLS) was born out of this and some of the projects have been a village wildlife survey, a bat walk, a nature walk, amphibian and reptile pond dipping, kestrel and owl boxes erected, bug hotels built, and wildflower planting leading to management of part of the churchyard for wildflowers and insects.

We had a productive meeting with some good ideas being put forward. It is our intention to see more trees planted in and around the village and to get children involved, so that each child could plant and 'own' a tree. We will aim at having Forest Schooling for the youngsters as there are local people trained and qualified in this field(!) of education.

The group unanimously agreed we need to encourage more wildflowers in gardens and verges. The Parish is charged for the Council to mow our verges. If the village could manage this ourselves then we would get the money back. This has been done in Whatcote. We will do a survey around the village to look at this possibility.

DOG POO IN OUR GARDEN AND AROUND THE VILLAGE.

I was absolutely appalled by what we found in our garden, on the morning of Sunday the 29th September; we're very proud of our garden and have worked extremely hard to make it beautiful.

We live by a footpath, so we expect to see walkers, they're usually village regulars, exercising their dogs and often we'll have a chat with them. Our front garden is open, so anybody or any animal can walk in.

Well - that morning, a small dog with a tummy problem defecated on our front lawn near to the back border. Rather than attempting to pick it up, it's owner took a handful of our woodbark chippings and placed them on top of the poo.

Working in our garden, Ed saw the pile of woodbark, not knowing what was underneath, kicked it back into the border and consequently his boot was covered in extremely smelly poo.

Our Cottage backs onto Oxhill Manor fields so we can see which people pick up after their dogs. Having been a livestock owner in my previous life, I know how important it is for dog poo to be picked up in fields. Farm animals can contract dreadful diseases caused by dog poo, vaccinations do not immunise your dog from several diseases. The two diseases of particular concern that can be presented as a result of dog faeces on open land are neosporosis and sarcocystosis and can be fatal to live stock. Please pick up after your dog, it could save another animals life. Humans can also get diseases from dogs faeces, children are so vulnerable, they don't always wash their hands after playing with a ball on open land.

I know we are not the only people who are experiencing this problem. Walking down Main Street this morning I saw two front gardens where dogs have done their business and the owners haven't picked it up. I was talking to Jackie our postie when I noticed another deposit of poo in somebody's front garden. Jackie said that our village has a huge problem with dogs' poo and she sees it on the pavements all the time. This is not something that we can be proud of, let's change that!

I know that this subject has been in the Oxhill News many times in the past, but please when ever your dog defecates, whether it be in my garden, in a field, or on a pavement where a someone could step on it; please be responsible for your dog's bowel movements and pick it up at all times. Please don't leave a bag full of poo hanging in the tree or leave it by the gate. If you do pick up your dog's poo then please make sure that you take it home and dispose of it sensibly.

It is illegal to let your dog roam free on the streets unleashed, so please keep your dog on the lead, then you will be able to see when they have done their business.

I have asked the Parish Council if it would be possible to erect some poo dispenser bags in the village, although I would've thought all dog owners would carry their own bags.

I love our village and I'm very proud to be part of this wonderful community. Let's all be proud of our village and keep it dog poo free.


