

PAUL SAYER'S CYCLING CHALLENGE RIDE EVERY DAY FOR 220 DAYS !

Many of you know that I ride my bikes a bit. Quite a lot actually. Some banter back at the start of lockdown encouraged me to set a target of riding for 50 days without a break, which became 100 days, and is now a target of 220 days. I have linked this challenge to the local Cyclists Fighting Cancer charity, which set up a 20in20 fund raising initiative at the start of the year. Since 2005 CFC have helped more than 6,000 children on the path to regaining their physical fitness, strength and confidence by giving them new bikes, adapted trikes and offering specialist activity support during treatment and on into recovery.



Most charities have had a very hard time this year, and I would really appreciate any support you can give them, and encouragement for me to finish this effort. I'm currently just over 75% of the way through with nearly 6000 miles covered, and I'm feeling it ! Fingers crossed for another two months of decent weather....the last day should be 16th October.

VILLAGE HALL A.G.M.

The A.G.M. took place on 10th August via Zoom. Committee members plus 10 Members under the new constitution were present.

The final accounts for 2019-2020 were circulated showing a healthy balance despite expenses relating to drain repairs, legal fees & survey costs. Income on lettings were up on the previous year.

The Chairman reported on the year including the creation of the CIO following the EGM in July 2019 and the consequent requirements of producing a new hire agreement, Safeguarding & Equality & Diversity policies. The resolution of the boundary issue, valuation of the property, design of the proposed extension, planning application and grant applications all combined to make it a very busy year.

The Chairman thanked her committee & others for all their work during the year especially Gill Stewart as Secretary for the very detailed & meticulous work she has undertaken.

Gill resigned from committee at the meeting after many years of service for which we are all very grateful. The rest of the committee were re-elected en bloc plus two new members Rachel & Geof Beesley who were warmly welcomed.

The Chairman reported on social events held during the year & thanked all those who had supported to make it so successful. New events included a family tea party & two popular history talks.

Grants from the County Councillors Fund (£1500 in August 2019), the Heart of England Community Fund (£2000 in December 2019) & Oxhill Parish Council (£400 December 2019) were all received and in the bank. In addition pledges of funds once redevelopment begins of £36,670 from ACRE & £10,000 from the Bernard Sunley Fund were obtained during the year. Other grant applications are ongoing.

Vanessa has asked me to write a recipe each month for the Oxhill News. As Oxhill is full of excellent bakers, it's a somewhat daunting task. My intention is to try to make the recipes seasonal where I can and also to include contributions from others. This first recipe was given to me by Gaida Webb a couple of years ago.

PEAR, WALNUT AND GINGER TRAYBAKE

I first tasted this delicious cake when Gaida baked it and brought some to Knit and Natter. The combination of pears and ginger is just perfect and this is an ideal recipe for when pear season starts shortly. If you don't have ready access to fresh pears, it can be made with tinned pears instead but make sure that they are drained well.

Ingredients

125 g butter or baking block at room temperature
220 g soft brown sugar, light or dark
2 large eggs (at room temperature to stop mixture curdling)
300 g self raising flour
1 tsp ground ginger
1 tsp mixed spice
1/2 tsp fine sea salt
100 g roughly chopped and toasted walnuts
200 ml soured cream
3 tbsp chopped stem ginger
3 ripe pears, cored, peeled and cut into 1 cm dice
1 tsp ground cinnamon
1 tbsp caster sugar
Icing sugar to dust

1. Preheat the oven to 180 C or 160 C fan.
2. Lightly grease and base line a 20-22 cm square, deep baking tin with baking parchment.
3. Cream the butter and sugar together, preferably with an electric mixer, until soft and fluffy. Add the eggs one at a time with a tablespoon of the flour, beating well after each addition.

4. Next, add the flour, ground ginger, spice, salt, walnuts, soured cream, stem ginger and half of the pears and fold in with a large metal spoon until well combined.
5. Spoon the mixture into the prepared tin, smoothing over the top. Arrange the remaining diced pears on top. Mix together the cinnamon and caster sugar and sprinkle evenly over the top.
6. Bake in the oven for 45-55 minutes until a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean. If it starts to brown too much after 45 minutes, cover with foil.
7. Allow to cool in the tin for 10 minutes before turning out onto a wire rack to cool completely. Dust the traybake with icing sugar and cut into about 12 pieces.

We took a large amount of honey from the hives back in June and members have been enjoying jars of this delicious tasting product from our bees.

The top fruit is very disappointing this year, late frosts and high winds destroyed most of the blossom and small fruitlets so apart from a very few pears and cooking apples there is little to see! Even the perry pears and cider apples are in short supply.

Regretfully we have decided to cancel Apple Day this year. There is too much uncertainty about gatherings and a lot to organise up front so this has not been an easy decision.

The Community Orchard is just behind the allotments on the Shenington Road in Tysoe and is open 24/7.

Due to the pandemic the Parochial Church Council (PCC) has not been able to hold its AGM this year yet. Usually at this meeting we like to acknowledge and thank all those people who help with the running of the church . These volunteers are listed as follows:

1. **Cleaning.** We are very lucky to have those people who are on the rota and those who join us for the Big Clean in November.
2. **Fundraising.** Our small social committee helps by providing cakes, lunches, afternoon teas, quizzes, auction of promises event, produce for Harvest Festival, mince pies and mulled wine for Christmas.

THE VILLAGE CARRIERS

The Rouses – John, his son Willoughby and, in turn, Willoughby’s son, Reg – were the village carriers for many years.

“There was a carrier in the village, Mr Willoughby Rouse, who also sold coal: his wife kept the little village shop nearby opposite the school. Coal was 10/ (50 pence) per ton; the carrier drove his horse and covered van to Shipston-on-Stour, five miles from Oxhill, to Banbury, and to Stratford-upon-Avon... on one day each week, the other two days he delivered coal on a trolley.

Sometimes my Grandpap Summerton would hire Rouse’s wagonette and cob to drive Granny, my mother and us children to see one or other of his sisters... The wagonette was also hired for school and Sunday School outings. Usually they were to Compton Wynates... Edge Hills were another favourite venue. Mad Hill was so steep that all the older children had to get out of the wagonette and push from the back, to help the horse; coming down the position was reversed – everybody pulled, whilst a brake, in the form of a piece of very heavy angle-iron – was attached by a chain to a back wheel of the vehicle.”

Willoughby was succeeded as carrier by his son, Reg, who, from the 1940s until his retirement in 1972, drove the Bedford bus. Some villagers remember it affectionately in its later days as “The Oxhill Flyer”, although older residents do not recognise this nickname, and it was not in general use.

Reg Rouse's bus forms the background for the wedding group of his niece Margaret Wheatcroft, whom he and his wife brought up, to Roy Wilks c1951.



The bus was repainted from blue to red during its long years on the roads. When blue, it is shown at the rally, probably c1950, and later in the 1960s, now red as residents remember it, in a photograph taken in Tysoe.

David Grasby, operating from Windmill Farm on the main Stratford to Banbury road, commenced operations of his coach company in 1958, at first concentrating on contract work and private hire. When Reg Rouse retired in 1972, Mr Grasby took over his bus services, and as the other major operator in the area cut back, was able to extend his network, concentrating on the Banbury, Leamington and Stratford-upon-Avon network. Mr Grasby himself retired in 1995.

REG AND HIS BUS HAVE MADE THEIR LAST RUN

WITH more than 600,000 miles under his belt Reg Rouse and his old bus have retired from the job of providing Oxhill with a bus service to Stratford, Shipston and Banbury.

At 69 Mr Rouse has had no insurance claims in 47 years of running the service with his old Bedford bus—in which, the villagers stoutly maintain, “he’s never late.” He admits that they

have been snowed up occasionally so he has had to put the wheel chains on—but they always got through. He was born and has always lived at Oxhill post office stores. It became a post office only in 1946 and he is now retiring to help run the family stores.

His old bus had six engine changes during its service but is still going strong. Its future has yet to be decided.

Grateful Oxhill passengers presented him with an elaborate

clock—so that he may continue to keep good time—and Mr Rouse has also been “absolutely overwhelmed” with presents from other villagers on his routes. Quite amazed, he said, “I am so grateful to everybody but I cannot get over all these presents. I got this lovely cabinet with bottles of whisky and brandy from the villagers at Ettington and a lovely watch from Stretton-on-Fosse passengers—I just haven’t been able to sort them all out yet.”

Taking over the service is another Oxhill villager, Mr E R Grasby—but not in the same old bus.

OXHILL PARISH COUNCIL
MINUTES OF A REMOTE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING
HELD ON TUESDAY 7TH JULY 2020 AT 8.00PM

Councillors Present

Cllr Harbour (Chairperson), Cllr Connolly, Cllr Rivers-Fletcher, Cllr Robertson and Cllr Stuart

Clerk to the Council, Mrs C Coles, District Cllr John Feilding and one villager

20/48. Apologies for absence

Cllr Chris Williams

20/49. To receive Declarations of Interest under the Council's Code of Conduct relating to business on the agenda

Cllr Stuart declared an interest in the Planning Application at Oak View, Green Lane.

20/50. To approve and sign the minutes of the meeting held on 13th May 2020
The minutes of the last meeting were approved and will be signed.

20/51. To note any matters arising from the minutes not included on this agenda for report only

Cllr Connolly gave an update on the rats. There has been further feedback from villagers and a pest control company called in. Cllr Connolly is to continue to monitor the situation.

20/52. Public Participation Session

Cllr John Fielding used this Agenda item to speak about a letter of complaint that he understood had been made to SDC about himself and Mr Hedley. The Chair denied that it was a complaint and referred to it as an 'enquiry'. The Chair agreed to forward the letter on.

20/53. To receive a report from the County and District Councillor

District Cllr Feilding reported that the Covid 19 pandemic had cost the district a lot of money. There is a Boundary Commission Review and some of the Councils may amalgamate. Leisure centres and pubs will be re-opening. The Chief Police Constable has put on extra patrols in the area. There is a lot of positiveness.

County Cllr Chris Williams had circulated his report.

The main points included:

Shire Hall is still in lockdown and staff working from home. All meetings are held on Microsoft Teams or Zoom. The Council is preparing a policy for continuing after lockdown. The first full meeting of the Council is on 23rd July.

The key financial headlines:

The total estimated financial impact is £60.0M. This is £16.5M more than reported due to including, a provision for the cost of social distancing on home to school transport should this be required in September and an increase in the estimated loss of income from business rates and council tax in 2020/21 and future years. The estimated costs are based on a lockdown until the end of July. The Authority does not anticipate any cash flow difficulties as a result of Covid 19. There will be areas where the increase in spend or loss of resourcing represents a permanent change. It is likely that the Authority will have to make some difficult choices about priorities over the coming months and increase in the level of budget reductions required over the medium term.

20/54. To approve Model Standing Orders and Financial Regulations

The model Standing Orders and Financial Regulations were both circulated prior to the meeting. They were approved and accepted.

20/55. To receive an update on footpaths

A list of footpath problems were reported at the last meeting.

Mr Beesley has shown an interest in being involved and introduced himself. He moved into the village in October and likes the strong community spirit. He is happy to be involved and improve the footpath network. There are a group of people who would be happy to co-ordinate lightweight maintenance tasks to keep footpaths open. Some paths are overgrown with vegetation. The footpaths fall under Rights of Way and it's a voluntary partnership scheme. They have limited resources. It was proposed by Cllr Connolly and seconded by the Chair that Mr Beesley will lead and co-ordinate the volunteer group.

Both bridges have been reported. Wooden slats for the bridge behind the church which has a gap in it, have been ordered. A second hand rail will be installed to make it safer for children to cross.

Cllr Feilding noted that there are various organisations such as the NFU and Ramblers who know the legalities and insurance requirements. All footpaths have to be kept open and accessible. There are stewardship schemes which enable farmers to get funding to deliver effective environmental management on their land. Walkers should be mindful of these schemes and walk on footpaths.

20/56. To discuss planting at Cariad

A letter was sent to the Enforcement Team at SDC. They have replied to say that the planting season has passed and it may not be appropriate to require further planting until October. Cllr Stuart noted that the property has now been sold.

Action: The Parish Clerk to pass this information to the Enforcement team at SDC.

20/57. To discuss a speed camera

Cllr Rivers-Fletcher noted the council's frustrations again as Highways will not allow a VAS to be put up. He has contacted Cllr I Seccombe, the leader of WCC and is awaiting a reply. He proposed to the Parish Council to purchase a speed camera at a cost of £200.00. Proposed by Cllr Connolly. It was agreed this is a positive step forward. It has been a discussion point for the last three years and will prove whether speeds are accurate. Cllr Feilding spoke about Speedwatch which runs in Tysoe. They are very active and know the legal position.

20/58. To receive an update on the new bus shelter

It was previously agreed that a wooden oak bus shelter would be made to stand outside the village hall. The village hall front would act as the back of the shelter. The cost is £2200.00. The Chair did obtain two quotes but this contractor was selected based on the bespoke design and how it will fit into the rural area. The Chair will obtain three installation quotes. WCC have waived the £121.00 fee.

20/59. To receive an update on planning

One new application had been received since the last meeting:

20/01157/FUL, Erection of 2 x bed semi detached properties at Oak View, Green Lane. No objections with comments. This application was received between meetings and Cllr Stuart did not take part in any decision making.

Older applications

20/00566/LBC, Repair of corner post at The Hollies, Rouse Lane. Granted by SDC.

20/00985/FUL, Provision of hardstanding to side of driveway and double gate at 11 Leys Field. Withdrawn.

20/01076/FUL and 20/01077/LBC, Work at The Old Rectory. No objections by PC.

20/60. Financial Report

20/62. To receive Councillors Reports

Cllr Robertson has received a quote to purchase and install an additional waste bin. The cost is £370.00 and the emptying annual cost is £111.86. It was agreed to purchase two bins. The contractor is installing bins in August if the Parish Council can pass the information to them before then.

Action: Cllr Robertson to submit a site plan.

Cllr Rivers-Fletcher spoke about the waste which is being dumped on the lane next to Oxhill Farm. This has been ongoing for a long time and reported to the authorities.

Action: Cllr Feilding and Cllr Stuart to meet on site.

Complaints have been received about motorbike noise in the village.

Action: Cllr Stuart to speak to the person involved.

20/63. Date and Time of Next Meeting

Tuesday 8th September 2020 at 8pm

The Chair thanked Mr Beesley for attending the meeting. There being no other business to discuss, the meeting closed at 9.20pm.

NEW INFRASTRUCTURE IN OXHILL

Your Parish Council has been listening to the Community and its concerns over a lack of protection from the weather whilst waiting for buses plus litter and dog fouling. Following a lot of discussion at various Parish Council Meetings (all open to the public) we agreed to provide a new Bus Shelter outside the Village Hall and some more rubbish bins around the village. The Bus Shelter is being made in the village and installed by a Warwickshire Highways approved company from Tysoe and its location approved by the Village Hall, on whose land it will sit. The approximate location of the Bins was determined by the PC but the actual locations were decided by Stratford District Council as they know and understand where they can be positioned legally and also be serviced by their Lorries.

Hopefully, these new additions will be appreciated by the village and their appearance accepted as further progress in the facilities available to us all.




